Squirrel Scouts are the newest section of the Scout family, offering 4–6 year olds their first adventure in Scouting. Through ageappropriate games, activities and stories, Squirrels give young children the chance to make friends, explore the world around them, and begin building the skills and confidence they will carry into Beavers and beyond.

Demand for Squirrels has been high across Worthing, reflecting the appetite from families for opportunities at this younger age. To meet this need, we were delighted to welcome new Squirrel Dreys at 1st Worthing, 1st Durrington and 2nd Durrington during the year. These new Dreys are already thriving, offering fun, inclusive programmes and giving more children the chance to start their Scouting journey earlier.

By opening up Scouting to this younger age group, we are not only supporting children at a vital stage in their development, but also helping to strengthen and grow our Groups for the future.

At the upper age range, we were delighted to see the launch of Wyrd Explorer Scout Unit in East Worthing, based at 3rd Worthing Scout Group. Established during the year, the Unit has already grown rapidly and now has over 20 members.

In November 2024, we reached a major milestone in our Transformation agenda by implementing the new Volunteer Experience programme and launching a suite of updated digital tools. Our volunteer framework was restructured to introduce clearer team-based roles, simplified governance across Groups, Districts and Counties, and new role titles — for example, 'Trustee Board' in place of 'Executive Committee'. Alongside this, we overhauled our learning and development approach with a two-tier framework: Growing Roots for core learning, and Branching Out for optional, role-specific development. These changes make learning more accessible and engaging for volunteers.

Membership and volunteer data was successfully migrated to the new platform, and the Go-Live in November enabled volunteers to start using the updated tools and processes. While the transformation presented challenges — including adapting to new roles, processes and systems — training, go-live support teams and regular communications have helped ensure volunteers are equipped and confident throughout the transition.

Responsibility for welcoming new volunteers into Group roles now sits directly with the Groups themselves. This gives both the Group and the individual greater ownership of the joining journey, with support tailored to local needs. Another important development was the retirement of Appointments Committees as part of the new streamlined joining process. I would like to record our sincere thanks to everyone who has served on our Appointments Committee over the years, and in particular to Judy, as Chair, and Barbara, as Secretary, whose outstanding service has ensured that countless new volunteers were warmly welcomed into Scouting.



Transformation has also reshaped how our District operates. Group Lead Volunteers and the Team Leader (14–24) are now central to the way we function, forming the core of the District Leadership Team alongside the Programme Team Leader, Volunteering Development Team Leader, Support Team Leader, the District Lead Volunteer and the Youth Lead. Together, this team sets the direction for everything we do.

The Programme Team focuses on helping sections deliver excellent programmes. This includes running District events, supporting our "centres of excellence" in Target Sports, Climbing and the Gang Show, and providing expertise in Nights Away, International Scouting, Top Awards and more. Their work ensures young people enjoy high-quality, varied experiences across the District.

The Volunteering Development Team exists to empower and support our adult volunteers, both in their roles and in their personal growth. This team brings together our Learning, Awards & Recognition, Volunteer Recruitment, and Go-Live teams — the latter having played a vital role in successfully launching the new digital tools.

Alongside the District Leadership Team, our Trustee Board provides the essential governance that underpins all our work. As the body responsible for oversight, compliance and good governance, the Trustee Board ensures we meet our obligations as a charity, use our resources wisely, and remain focused on our purpose. Their contribution is less visible day-to-day, but it is vital in enabling Scouting in Worthing to thrive.

For many parents, camping is the activity they most strongly associate with Scouting, and in Worthing we are proud of the wide range of camping opportunities we offer our young people. Because camping carries greater risks than weekly meetings, we require adults leading these events to hold a Nights Away Permit — a recognised standard of training and experience that ensures activities are delivered safely and well. Across the District, 64 of these permits are currently held, supported by a dedicated team of Nights Away Advisers who help volunteers maintain the highest standards. As we look to the year ahead, our focus is on building on the strong foundations laid through Transformation. We aim to continue growing provision at both ends of the age range — welcoming more Squirrel Dreys to meet demand, while strengthening Explorer and Network opportunities for older young people. Supporting and developing our volunteers remains central, with the new structures giving us the tools to make their experience simpler and more rewarding. We also plan to grow our programme offer through District events, international opportunities, and recognition of achievement through Top Awards. Above all, our vision is to ensure that every young person in Worthing has the opportunity to access Scouting, and that every volunteer feels valued and supported in making this happen.



Finally, a heartfelt thank you to every adult volunteer in Worthing — whether supporting governance or working directly with young people — for the time, energy and commitment you have given throughout the year.

I am especially grateful to our District Leadership Team for steering us through Transformation and ensuring our Groups and Sections feel supported. Our Trustee Board also deserves recognition for their careful governance and stewardship, which enables Scouting here to flourish as a charity.

Sincere thanks go to those who make our programme possible: the teams behind Target Sports, Climbing, the Gang Show, Nights Away, International, and Top Awards. Likewise, our Volunteering Development Team, including Learning, Awards & Recognition, Volunteer Recruitment, and Go-Live, have done vital work to support and grow our adult volunteers.

Above all, my gratitude extends to every Section Team across Worthing. Week after week you give your time to create safe, fun, adventurous programmes that change young people's lives. It is your dedication that keeps Scouting strong in our District.





Over the last few years Scouting has seen many changes, whether as more recently, it be what we call ourselves in our roles or how we go about our day-to-day business; we have all had to evolve, learn and change. 2024/25 has been no different to any other year. Like so many voluntary organisations we face many challenges, none more so than finding volunteers to help lead or support our various groups across all the age groups. It is testimony to your commitment to Scouting that you are all here tonight at this AGM, when I'm sure you have a hundred and one things at home you would prefer to do.

Scouting is very much about the young people who come to us for a variety of reasons. Together let's harness their skills and to the best of our ability give them the best start to life.






Whether camping outdoors or staying indoors, these experiences build confidence, independence, and resilience as they try new things and take on responsibilities. Working together on tasks like cooking, setting up camp, or supporting one another fosters teamwork, leadership, and problem-solving skills. Nights away also strengthen friendships and create lasting memories, while encouraging creativity, resourcefulness, and a spirit of adventure. Above all, they provide a safe environment for young people to challenge themselves, discover new talents, and gain life skills that prepare them for the future.

Scouting's Nights Away Permits ensure these valuable experiences happen in a safe, well-supported environment. Leaders are trained, assessed, and approved to deliver residential activities with the right skills, knowledge, and safeguards in place. This system gives parents confidence that camps and sleepovers are carefully planned and risk-managed, while giving young people the freedom to enjoy adventure, fun, and learning in a secure setting.

In our District, we're fortunate to have three dedicated Nights Away Advisers — Paul, Al, and Chris — who support all leaders in gaining their permits. They are there to guide adults through the process, helping them recognise their existing skills, build confidence, and develop new abilities where needed. Their encouragement and practical advice make the journey to achieving a permit positive and supportive, ensuring every leader feels capable of providing safe and rewarding nights away for young people.




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

In Scouting, adults can gain permits to lead activities such as adventurous hikes, water sports, and nights away – the kinds of experiences that bring challenge, fun, and unforgettable memories for young people. These permits exist to make sure every activity is safe, well-organised, and well-supported, giving families confidence and enabling leaders to deliver exciting programmes. We are proud to have such a talented pool of adults across Worthing, whose skills and dedication mean that young people can enjoy a wide range of activities in safe hands. Every permit achieved is not only a reflection of their commitment but also a celebration of the many opportunities they create for adventure, growth, and fun.





The Wood Badge has long been a recognised symbol of an adult volunteer's commitment to learning and development in Scouting. It represents the completion of training and the ability to provide safe, high-quality experiences for young people. From November 2024, the Wood Badge will no longer be the central outcome of adult training. Instead, the focus shifts to a more flexible, role-based learning journey designed to support volunteers in gaining the skills and confidence they need more quickly. While the Wood Badge continues to hold reflect a higher level of training and historic significance, the new approach ensures training is modern, accessible, and relevant.

The Target sports SASU exists to provide the members of the district Air rifle, Air Pistol, Crossbow and Archery (among others) opportunities and we will run these sessions for any sections in the district on request. The sessions are best run for Scouts and Explorers and we will do experience sessions for cubs as well. Safety is always paramount so we don't offer sessions for younger members.

Worthing has one of the best equipped, most experienced groups in the country with great connections to the wider shooting community and has had success in promoting our members to nationally significant ranks, in fact the current British and English Air Rifle champion started his career with us only a few years ago.

In April 65 Cubs, Brownies, Scouts, Guides, Explorers, Rangers and Young Adults having rehearsed as a Gang for over 7 months, made their home for a week at the Pavilion Theatre for the 2024 Worthing Scout and Guide Gangshow. Hard work, commitment and dedication was seen by all. In the background the Production and Business teams had been working for 18 months to get the show ready for the stage. The to do list is huge.

During show week there were over 35 Adults and youth members from Scouting and Girl Guiding working tirelessly behind the scenes to keep the Gang in the right place at the right time wearing the right things! In total we have just over 100 members working backstage and

performing.

We see the Young People grow in Self-confidence over the rehearsal period and during show week. They build new friendship groups and you can see these grow. As a Gang they have more self-belief that they can do it, individually and as a team. For an 8 year old Cub, standing on the stage for the very first time is extremely scary (I have been there!).

We are inclusive and take Young People into the cast who have visible and invisible disabilities. We will adjust numbers and rehearsals to suit them as and when needed. This year we had our assessment to ascertain if we remain worthy of Red Scarf recognition, an accolade we have held since the 1970's when it was awarded by Ralph Reader (the Founder of Gang Show) himself. We passed it with some "Excellence" ratings. The inclusion of the Young People in helping create the show was seen very favourably. Can we learn in a few areas, yes we can - we are a fairly new team but all with Theatre experience outside of Scouting and Girl Guiding.

Advertising, Marketing and the creation of the Programme threw a bit of a curveball in January due to sickness in the team we had assembled. Luckily, we had someone in the family who just happened to be an ace photographer and graphic designer – roll in Georgia Scott to save the day. The Explorer section finishes the year with 7 units, Blake, Excelsior & Nomads I and II, Osprey, Phoenix, Wyrd and Young Leaders.

The units are all well-led, and I would like to extend my thanks to all the leaders and other adults running Explorer sections across the district!

Network has started to become more active, with some social events, participation in various Pride events, a DofE Gold Practice expedition in the Brecon Beacons, and a Qualifying expedition in the Peak District.

The units do various activities together, and it is good to see the various unit leaders often helping other units out. When they are not out having fun at local events, the unit members continue to undertake the higher Chief Scout awards, work towards King's Scouts awards and along this path achieve their Duke of Edinburgh's award.

Of the 141 DofE award completions in the county last year, 34 In total from Worthing, 23 Bronze, 10 Silver and 1 Gold.

These were then built on to achieve. Chief Scouts Platinum – 8, Chief Scouts Diamond – 12, Young Leader belt – 7 Kings Scout Awards – 3

After our large expedition to Kandersteg, the Explorer units have done their own summer camps this last year. They have done the annual International Bivvy camp day together, and some other evening events.

The network has been planning an Explorer belt which has evolved in its nature. They are actively looking for events they can attend, local, national or internationally. I hope they continue to build on their activity.

Al Chartres 14-24 Team Leader The number of Explorers across the district has been increasing all year, however fell to 183 at census. Girl Explorer Scouts make up 35.5% of the numbers. We continue to be an inclusive and diverse section.

Around 80 young adults have registered as Network members currently.

Many of the Explorers in addition to attending their units also help at younger sections as young leaders and often continue as adult leaders as they turn 18.

EXPLORERS Excelsior & Nomads

The unit continues with its ongoing meeting arrangements with 1st Ferring, 1st Worthing, 3rd Worthing and 2nd Worthing. A formal partnership arrangement is in place with 1st Ferring, ensuring the relationship works for both the Group and the Explorer unit. The unit members come from all over the district and represent Scouts moving on from most groups.

The unit ends the year with 69 Explorer Scouts representing ages across our age range, 13 – 17. Still high numbers and the split between girls and boys is around 40%/60%.

Many stayed with us and turned 18 during the year, and we had to sadly say goodbye to them. I am pleased to say many decided to continue as adult leaders, and several more are within Network whilst they study away from home.

With a large and growing Explorer Unit of this size, a large and experienced leadership team is a must. Without the tireless efforts of the team made up of Alison Linley, Stuart Burchett, Mike Hudgell, Steven Jenkins, Zoe Chartres, Lily Wingrove, Kayleigh Livermore, Will Marshall, and Ash Thwaites. Ann Hudgell has been our backup adult who helps when needed and is available often at short notice. A big thanks to the team for turning out each week and dealing with the challenges as they present themselves. The support of the groups previously mentioned is additionally much appreciated. Thanks for their support.

Outcomes for Chief Scouts and DofE are growing again despite many schools also offering many of their year 8 pupils the chance to undertake Bronze, as many swap to undertake Silver and Gold at Explorers.



EXPLORERS Excelsior & Nomads

Members of the unit had many separate opportunities to attend night's away events with either the unit or other sections across the county! After our trip to Kandersteg the year before, we had a quieter, more traditional trip to Broadstone Warren to undertake many of their new high activities! We again had teams enter the Borderhike in Derbyshire, representing themselves well. Several members, Explorers and Adults have been camping every month of the year towards their Welsh Scout dragon Camping award. All seasons, all weathers, but immense fun for all!

As the unit has grown so does the diversity of the activities the Explorers decide to undertake for our core programme,

the Chief Scouts awards and of course DofE. So many take the opportunity to take the lead and instigate many events and activities, and some we used to do but believed were not so popular and are back in favour, are now in the plan for the coming years.

Looking again at the diversity within the DofE programme, at some of the activities undertaken for Volunteering, Skills and Physical the range and nature undertaken is incredibly broad and impressive. Skills range from car mechanics and maintenance to personal care, working out at the Gym popular now for physical and volunteering whilst still often achieved as a Young Leader, a growing number are opting for helping in many of the town's charity shops.

At the end of March this year, we had 48 invested Explorers. We continue to be one of the biggest Explorer Units in the UK. Osprey ESU continue in partnership with 8th Worthing and we appreciate the mutual benefits that being a part of the group bring. We have 19 members of the Unit serving as Young Leaders within the group.

DofE Programme

We have had a successful year with the DofE awards, seeing Osprey Explorers achieve:

- · 5 x Bronze
- · 3 x Silver
- · 1 x Gold

We currently have 24 Explorer's working towards their Bronze award and 11 towards their Silver.

We held successful expeditions for both Bronze and Silver levels this year;

In May, 14 Explorers took part in their Bronze Qualifying Expedition in the West Dean area and in August, 5 Explorers completed their Silver expedition in the New Forest.

Camps

In July 2024, 29 Explorers and a team of 7 Leaders headed to the Dockland Scout Project to stay on a ship moored in Canary Wharf, London for a week. They visited the O2, took part in an immersive experience; Phantom Peak, solved a murder mystery on the boat, got a behind the scenes tour of the Houses of Parliament, took in the sights at the top of Tower Bridge, watched Wicked on the West End, visited Mudchute Farm to feed the animals, powerboating, kayaking, giant paddleboarding, created and filmed movies, got dressed up for a fancy party, went to the London museums and raced against each other in the Monopoly Challenge! However, our projections show that, assuming the expected Scout numbers make their way to the unit after Easter next year, numbers will start to climb again.

Never-the-less, smaller numbers have given us the opportunity to work more closely with individuals, giving more hands-on time for Explorers to engage in activities such as cooking, construction challenges, treasure hunt participation, and greater opportunity to have more climbs when rock climbing.

We have also enjoyed some ice skating with the Scout Troops in the Steyne, as well as Unit activities such as paddleboarding at Southwater Country Park, very windy sailing on 'Supeta', a service camp at Hillside Camp site and successfully negotiating an Escape room in the Guildbourne.

We intend working closely with both Troops in the coming year, to do our best to encourage the transition into the unit.
